Archaeology Section

ctober 4, 2018: The Section Chair, Bob Moore, called the meeting to order at 7:40 pm. After introductions, Bob gave an overview of the upcoming talks to 16 attendees. He then reported that Garth Clark was resigning as Vice Chair and Section Board Representative due to other business commitments. Bob said that Nancy would be replacing Garth as the Board Representative and running for the position of Vice Chair in the upcoming November election. As a result, the Section was looking for nominations for Secretary. For 2019, the Secretary would be primarily responsible for attending the monthly programs, taking attendance, and minutes. The Vice Chair would be handling promotion of events, which had been handled by the Secretary. Bob then called for nominations for Secretary. Bob said he was willing to continue as Chair and Treasurer. He then announced that the Section would again be taking a summer hiatus and introduced the speaker, Garth Clark. After the talk, there were Q & A and time to view Garth's Roman denarius coins. The meeting adjourned at 9:05 p.m.

Program: Garth gave an excellent talk entitled "Coin Hoards Reveal Third Century Roman Crisis." He spoke about the reasons for hoarding and noted the main types of hoards: foundry, merchant, personal, loot from raids, and votive. He talked about how technology such as ground-penetrating radar and sophisticated metal detectors can locate hoards. Garth spoke briefly about coin restoration techniques and detailed how Roman hoards can be dated accurately, based on their coins. He gave several historical examples and noted that due to the rapid turnover of emperors and the changing content of silver in coins for political and economic reasons, hoards can be accurately dated to a particular emperor's reign. Each new emperor had the

previous emperors' coins melted down and recycled, which meant that coin hoards reflect the reigning emperor at the time of burial. Garth concluded by noting that after the assassination of Maximinus in 238 AD. coins were only minted to pay the military and fund battles. Denarius coins were no longer minted and Rome went into a period of turmoil due to invasions, revolts. plagues and finally hyperinflation until it's fall in 476 AD

November 1, 2018: Bob Moore called the meeting to order at 7:40 pm. He then presented the 2019 officer nominations and asked if there were any other nominations. There were none. Toni Lucci moved to approve the nominations, Garth Clark

seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

For 2019, the following Archaeology Section Officers were approved:

Bob reviewed the upcoming programs and asked if there is any other business. There was none. Following the talk and discussion, the meeting adjourned at 9:00 pm.

Program: Bob Moore spoke on the "Golden Age of the Knights of Saint John" while Nancy Engelhardt-Moore assisted. Bob reviewed the history of the Knights and showed photos from the Moores' 2017 trip to Malta.

After his appointment as the rector of the hospice of Jerusalem in 1080, the Blessed Gerard founded the Order of St. John of Jerusalem (Knights Hospitaller) in 1088. During the great siege of Jerusalem by the Sultan of Egypt in 1099, Gerard cared for the sick and wounded, and later he built many hospitals.

Pope Paschal II recognized the Order as a new Religious Order in 1113. After Gerard's death, Raymond du Puy of France militarized the Order that were involved in 13 major actions and gained many riches. In 1291, Jerusalem fell and the Knights took their riches to Rhodes and built the fortified Palace of the Grand Master.

Bob talked about the Ottoman Siege of 1480 and the attack of Suleiman the Magnificent in 1522, where the Knights held against an army of 100,000 for six months. Broke after defending Rhodes, they were allowed to withdraw to Sicily and later to Malta. Legend states that they paid their Maltese lease by giving one falcon to the King each year.

Bob then talked about the extensive fortifications built by the Knights around Malta and showed photos of amazing forts, the Palace Armoury, and St. John's Co-Cathedral. In 1565, Suleiman initiated the Ottoman Siege with 40,000 men. Although heavily

outnumbered, the Knights defeated the Ottomans. But in 1798 when Napoleon attacked, the Knights were unpopular with the Maltese and one of the French Knights

betraved the Order and they fled. Unlike the more famous Knights Templar, they still survive today. Bob noted that the "Knights of Malta" are now known as the Sovereign Military Hospitaller Order of Saint John of Jerusalem. Rhodes, and of Malta. They are based in Rome. and he revealed that the Southwest Headquarters the Knights and Dames is in Houston.




Next Board of Directors meeting: Tuesday, December 4, 2018 at 7:30 p.m.



REMEMBERING THE MAYFLOWER

n December 21, 1620, a little ship of 180 tons made landfall in the New World after a rough and stormy nine-week voyage from England. The Mayflower, with 102 persons aboard, including 33 children, carried the Pilgrims to their new home and laid the cornerstone of a nation.

Captain Christopher Jones obligingly stood by in Cape Cod Bay throughout that dreadful first winter. But by spring, with more than half the Pilgrims and a large number of his crew dead from the hardships of the New England winter, Jones set sail for England. Few paid any attention to Mayflower's return. She was, perhaps, the least conspicuous of the 40 to 50 vessels that sailed for America every year with settlers or to fish. In 1624, the Mayflower was declared "in ruins," and sold. With that, the ship passed into oblivion, not to be noticed again for three centuries.

Few Americans are aware that the Mayflower, one of the most famous ships in this nation's history, still lives—as part of a barn in the tiny English village of Jordans, Buckinghamshire. There it stands in the midst of the pristine beechwoods of the Chilterns, about an hour's journey from London.

For more than 300 years, she has lain upside down on a brick floor, her hull serving as the roof of a barn owned by the Society of Friends (Quakers). The original coat of red paint has long since disappeared, but the sturdy oak timbers are still solid. The curved beams of her hull are bleached white and stand out like the skeletal ribs of an enormous whale.

But how did the remains of the Mayflower end up as a barn in this rolling countryside? And how do we know—for sure—that these remains are of the Pilgrims' ship? The tradition that this barn was fashioned from the Mayflower is generations old in the neighborhood. Just to make sure, a group of experts launched an exhaustive historical detective hunt that dug up enough evidence to convince everyone of its authenticity.

First, they discovered a 350-year-old bill of sale stating the vessel was sold to a Buckinghamshire farmer named William Russell. It brought only \$384 in the transaction, at current rates of exchange. Its five great anchors went for less than \$100. The set of sails brought \$45, and "ye pitch pot and kettle" were knocked down for \$1.90. The spars were donated to the nearby town

of Abington, and they were used in the construction of their Congregational Church, which is still in use.


Russell reassembled the Mayflower as a livestock shelter, then proceeded to sell it—along with the adjoining farmhouse—to the Quakers.

The old farm kitchen and barn were built a year or so after. On one of the beams in the barn, one can easily decipher the letters "R HAR I", which experts conclude is all that remains of the words, "MAYFLOWER HARWICH." Possibly the most conclusive bit of evidence is found in the diary of William Russell Bradford, who recorded every detail of the ship's voyage to America. Bradford described a terrible storm that, at its height, cracked one of the beams amid-ship. A great iron screw of a printing press stored in the ship's hold was set in position to bolster the sagging beam, enabling the vessel to continue on her journey to the New World.

In the Mayflower barn, there is a 15-foot crack in one of the beams supporting the roof. It corresponds exactly to the precise description given in Bradford's diary. American promoters have attempted several times to purchase the historical monument from the Quakers and move it to the United States. Each offer is refused.

Perhaps it is just as well. There are far worse places where the Mayflower might have ended her days. In fact, looking at the English countryside falling away in all directions from the barn, one thinks the Pilgrims could hardly have wished for a more fitting "harbor" for the brave little vessel that carried them safely to America more than 350 years ago.

Tourmaline, a Mineral for Christmas?

hat colors do you think of for Christmas? I think of White, Red, and Green. White for

snow, green for the traditional Christmas tree, and Red for the suit Santa Claus wears. An Internet search for a stone or mineral for much like Christmas. birthstone, vielded no results. Therefore. nominate Ι Tourmaline varietv Elbaite. specifically the type called Watermelon Tourmaline as the Christmas Mineral. It is red and green like watermelon, and often sits on a base (matrix) of white albite, quartz, or Cleavelandite. If it is cut into a gemstone, you retain only the tourmaline



portion of the specimen; you lose the white color, but close enough!

Tourmaline is actually a family with 33 recognized members that span the color spectrum. Elbaite is the variety of tourmaline most people encounter in gemstones. It has the chemical composition of Na(Li1.5,Al1.5)Al6Si6O18(BO3)3(OH)3OH; you have to wonder how all those chemicals get together in one solution to create the mineral! It has a Mohs hardness of 7.5 slightly harder than quartz. Brazil is the world's largest producer of Tourmaline variety Elbaite, but that title once belonged to the mines in San Diego, California.

If you would rather have a Christmas Rock rather than a Mineral, and if you are willing to give up

the white color, then I would nominate Bloodstone as the Christmas Rock, Bloodstone is also the birthstone for March, but then tourmaline (unspecified variety) is also the birthstone for October. Bloodstone, also known as heliotrope, is a green chalcedony with red spots or blobs. It is a member of the Quartz family with a chemical composition of SiO₂ and a Mohs hardness of 6.5 to 7.0.

The majority of the Bloodstone on the market comes from Indonesia. It is also found in many other parts of the world. including here in the United States. Locations in the US include California and other states—including Texas.

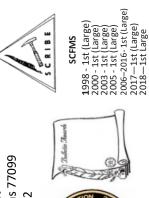
